On Friday August 26th, AC Transit broke ground on its much anticipated Bus Rapid Transit project. The ceremony included remarks

from U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx, Congresswoman Barbara Lee, Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf and Mayor Pauline Russo Cutter. The BRT line will stretch 9.5 miles from Downtown Oakland to the San Leandro BART station. There are five planned stops within City limits and preliminary construction work has begun on East 14th St.





SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION

This memo is regarding a public meeting to gather input from local residents and businesses on the design of a roundabout at the intersection of MacArthur Boulevard/Superior Avenue/Foothill Boulevard. This is for information only and no action is required.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION



The intersection of MacArthur Boulevard/Superior Avenue/Foothill Boulevard is currently controlled by stop signs; traffic from Foothill Boulevard and Superior Avenue have to stop while traffic along MacArthur Boulevard does not. Due to the speed and volume of traffic along MacArthur Boulevard, drivers approaching the project intersection from Foothill Boulevard and Superior Avenue experience significant wait times, especially during commute hours. In addition, the project intersection has a vehicle collision rate over three times higher than the statewide average based on traffic volume.

Traffic studies showed that a roundabout will yield the most improvement in traffic flow compared to other options that were analyzed, such as the installation of traffic signals. When constructed, this will be the first roundabout to be installed in San Leandro. BKF Engineers was recently hired to complete the plans, specifications and estimates for the subject project. They are the same engineering firm that completed the conceptual plan for the roundabout in 2009.

A public outreach meeting is scheduled from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 13, 2016 in the Lecture Hall at the San Leandro Main Library. The purpose of the meeting is to provide information on the project and also to gather public comments on the conceptual design. The attached postcard will be mailed to nearby businesses and residents. Also attached is a copy of the conceptual design for the roundabout.
